Presentation	<p>Cream: 20mg/g Oral Gel: 20mg/mL Solution: 20mg/mL</p>
Dose	<p><u>Tinea</u> Topical (cream): Apply cream to the affected area TWICE daily. Continue treatment until the lesions have completely healed and for a further TWO weeks.</p> <p><u>Oral thrush</u> Topical/Oral (Oral gel): Adults, Children >2years: HALF a spoonful (2.5mL) using the measure provided FOUR times daily (continue for 7-14 days).</p> <p><u>Fungal nail infection</u> Topical (solution): apply a thin layer of solution to affected nail(s) TWO to THREE times daily. Continue treatment until a new nail has grown.</p>
Administration	<p>Oral Gel: Best after a meal or drink; keep it in your mouth for as long as possible before swallowing.</p>
Pregnancy	<p>1st Trimester: Safe to use. 2nd Trimester: Safe to use. 3rd Trimester: Safe to use.</p>
Breastfeeding	<p>Safe to use.</p>
