ADULT MEDICATION GUIDELINE

NICOTINE

Presentation	Patch: 7mg/24hr, 14mg/24hr, 21mg/24hr
	Gum: 2mg, 4mg
	Inhalator: 15mg cartridge
Dose	Nicotine Replacement Therapy (NRT)
	<u>Gum</u>
	High nicotine dependence: usually 6–10 pieces of 4 mg gum daily. Avoid >1 piece/hour. After 4–8 weeks reduce to 2 mg, then stop or taper use over a further 4 weeks to zero.
	Moderate nicotine dependence: usually 8–12 pieces of 2 mg gum daily.
	<u>Patch</u>
	Moderate-to-high nicotine dependence: ONE 21 mg/24 hours patch daily
	Low-to-moderate nicotine dependence: ONE 14 mg/24 hours patch daily
	Stop within 12 weeks (may stop abruptly or by reducing strength of patches)
	<u>Inhalation</u>
	Inhale according to craving or withdrawal symptoms (or every 2 to 4 hours) to a maximum of 6 cartridges daily. Use for 3 months then gradually reduce dose to 1-2 cartridges per day then stop. Use beyond 12 months is not recommended.
Administration	<u>Gum</u>
	Chew gum slowly, bite gum about 10 times, until tingling or bitter taste, then park gum between cheek and upper gum until tingling subsides, then chew again. Each piece usually lasts about 30 minutes (when it no longer causes tingling).
	If the gum is too bulky, pieces may be cut in half and used more often.
	Excessive chewing causes salivation, which can cause indigestion.
	<u>Patch</u>
	Apply to a non- hairy, clean, dry place on the upper body or outer part of the upper arm, once each day, preferably on waking. Rotate patch application site (do not use the same site for at least 3 days).

	<u>Inhalation</u>			
	Assemble the inhalator just before use. Open cartridges should not be used the next day.			
	Align marks on the mouthpiece and pull off the top. Remove ONE cartrider from the blister strip and press it firmly into the bottom of the mouthpiece (until the seal breaks). Replace the mouthpiece top (with marks aligned) and push both pieces firmly together to break the other seal on the cartrider Twist the mouthpiece to misalign the marks.			
	Inhale the dose through the mouthpiece as required using either short puffs or deep inhalations for up to 40 minutes.			
Pregnancy and Breastfeeding	There is limited safety information available regarding the use of nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) in pregnancy and breastfeeding. All smokers are encouraged to quit smoking and non-pharmacological strategies should be employed first if possible during pregnancy and breastfeeding.
